



Teen with Prosthetic on Leg and No Right Arm Attempts Ultra-Challenging Spartan Race This Weekend to Prove Disabilities Do Not Equal Limitations



17 year old Jeffrey, a patient at Shriners Hospitals for Children[®] - Canada since the age of 5 months, was born without a right hand or right foot. But that hasn't stopped this young man who wants to prove that disabilities do not necessarily mean limitations. He has run three Spartan Races this summer and on Sunday, he will attempt the most difficult so far, a 21+km "Beast". Spartan Races are among the most challenging obstacle courses in the world, usually on mountainous terrain, making them that much more exhausting. Usually only elites do the "Beast", but Jeffrey is determined to complete it in order to get his "Trifecta" medals (a Sprint (5 km), a Super (13 km) and a Beast (21 km). "I want to show people – those with disabilities and



those without – that you can do so much more than you think you can," says Jeffrey. "I'm also doing this to raise \$10,000 for Canada Shriners Hospital," he continues. "Without their help, I wouldn't be in a position to do Spartan Races. It's my turn to give back."

Jeffrey started the Spartan Race season running a Super in Quebec City and then doing Sprints in Ottawa and Montreal. This Sunday comes the last – and biggest – challenge of them all. His father, Patrick Beausoleil, will be running with him. "We saw Jeffrey doing Spartan Races last year and it was so inspiring," Patrick says. "He pushed me to get into better shape and follow him. He inspires so many and I don't think he realizes how much." Indeed Jeffrey has been inspiring students in the Montreal-area for the past two years as well. He has been doing school tours for Canada Shriners Hospital, talking to students about living with a

disability, bullying and about pushing your limits to accomplish more.
